Programa Community College Initiative (CCI)

A Pró-Reitoria de Extensão (PROEX), por meio de sua Diretoria de Relações Internacionais e Interinstitucionais (DRIIT), em parceria com o Escritório da Embaixada dos EUA em Belo Horizonte, tornam pública a presente Chamada para **indicar** até 2 alunos de cursos de graduação do IF Sudeste MG para o pleito de bolsas de estudo pelo Programa *Community College Initiative*.

1. VISÃO GERAL DO PROGRAMA

1.1. O *Community College Initiative* é patrocinado pelo Departamento de Estado dos EUA com financiamento fornecido pelo Governo desse país, administrado pelo *Northern Virginia Community College (NOVA)*, em cooperação com o *Community College Consortium*.

1.2. O Programa CCI incentiva uma aprendizagem holística e troca de experiências, concentrando-se em cinco pilares: acadêmico, intercâmbio cultural, práticas extensionistas, desenvolvimento profissional de carreira, liderança e planejamento de ação. Todos os pilares do Programa CCI são de igual importância.

1.3. O programa fornece aos participantes um período de estudos acadêmicos de 10 meses em uma Universidade Comunitária (Community College) dos Estados Unidos, **sem concessão de grau acadêmico**, projetados para desenvolvimento de habilidades técnicas dos participantes, aprimoramento de suas capacidades de liderança, e de sua proficiência em Inglês. O programa também oferece oportunidades para estágios profissionais, práticas extensionistas e envolvimento com a comunidade.

1.4. Depois de concluir o programa, os participantes voltam para casa com habilidades aprimoradas para contribuir com o desenvolvimento econômico de suas comunidades locais. Estas contribuições serão realizadas em forma de atividades devolutivas no IF Sudeste MG que podem incluir seminários, apresentações de experiências, publicação de artigos, entre outros (ver item 10 desta chamada).

1.5. A validação das atividades e das disciplinas cursadas deverá ser avaliada pelas coordenações dos cursos à que os discentes estejam vinculados, mediante apresentação de toda documentação obtida.

1.6. O Programa CCI oferece estudo nas seguintes áreas:

- 1.6.1. Agricultura
- 1.6.2. Engenharia Aplicada
- 1.6.3. Gestão Empresarial / Administração
- 1.6.4. Educação Infantil
- 1.6.5. Tecnologia da Informação (TI)
- 1.6.6. Meios de comunicação
- 1.6.7. Segurança Pública
- 1.6.8. Gestão de Turismo e Hospitalidade

1.7. Os cursos e programas de estudo variam de acordo com as Universidades que irão receber os alunos. Todas as universidades oferecem aulas introdutórias que serão feitas durante os primeiros dois anos de um bacharelado de quatro anos.

1.8. Os participantes estão se inscrevendo para o Programa CCI e não para um programa de graduação acadêmica específico em uma instituição em particular. Com base em sua proficiência em inglês, os participantes terão acesso aos cursos na Universidade Comunitária (Community College) onde serão alocados. Os participantes podem obter um certificado acadêmico em sua área de estudo ou concluir cursos que sejam relevantes para seus objetivos profissionais.

Parágrafo único: O programa e os certificados obtidos não conferem quaisquer graus acadêmicos aos participantes.

1.9. Os participantes irão combinar cursos acadêmicos ou profissionais com experiência prática por meio de estágios ou de práticas extensionistas que irão ajudá-los a construir suas habilidades e capacidades profissionais.

2. DA FINALIDADE DESTA CHAMADA

2.1. Indicar dois (02) alunos de cursos de graduação do IF Sudeste MG para concorrerem em processo de seleção próprio organizado e conduzido pela coordenação do programa CCI e pelo consulado dos Estados Unidos em Belo Horizonte.

2.2. Fomentar a integração, o fortalecimento e a consolidação do processo de internacionalização do IF Sudeste MG, proporcionando aos dois discentes selecionados a oportunidade de cursarem 10 meses de atividades acadêmicas em uma Universidade Comunitária nos Estados Unidos, e, ao retornarem ao Brasil, contribuírem com os conhecimentos adquiridos para suas comunidades locais com a realização de atividades devolutivas à comunidade acadêmica.

2.3. Devido à situação de saúde pública global, agravada pela pandemia de Covid-19, o programa poderá ser realizado virtualmente.

3. REQUISITOS DE ELEGIBILIDADE PARA O PROGRAMA CCI

3.1. A competição para o Programa CCI é baseada no mérito e aberta a qualquer pessoa que:

3.1.1. Seja cidadão brasileiro, possua passaporte válido e resida no Brasil no momento de sua candidatura;

3.1.2. Tenha pelo menos 18 anos em 1º de julho de 2021;

3.1.3. Possui diploma de ensino médio concluído com sucesso;

3.1.4. Esteja nos anos iniciais de seu curso de graduação (o critério de desempate irá privilegiar os nomeados que estejam mais no início de seus cursos) conforme o quadro abaixo:

3.1.5. Demonstre compromisso com o campo selecionado de estudo através de experiência acadêmica ou profissional. O programa visa a identificar participantes com habilidades ou interesse comprovados e experiência profissional limitada nas áreas de estudo oferecidas;

3.1.6. Os discentes candidatos do IF Sudeste MG precisam possuir conhecimento básico de inglês. Todos os candidatos terão sua proficiência avaliada com base em produção escrita (ver item 9.2.1) e por meio de entrevista (9.2.3) obrigatoria a todos os candidatos.

3.1.6.1. Os candidatos que possuírem alguma certificação de proficiência correspondente aos valores mínimos entre 400 e 500 do TOEFL PBT (conforme tabela abaixo) poderão apresentar este certificado, mas deverão participar da entrevista igualmente.

3.1.7. Tenha experiência limitada ou nenhuma experiência de estudo no exterior;

3.1.8. Envie o formulário de aplicação original completo (ANEXO II), obrigatoriamente em inglês.

3.1.9. Seja capaz de receber um visto J-1 dos EUA na data prevista no cronograma (ver item 11 desta chamada) e atender às condições do programa para manter esse status;

3.1.10. Estar disposto e fisicamente apto para concluir o programa em sua totalidade, incluindo atividades ou viagens que podem ser programadas em qualquer dia da semana, incluindo de manhã cedo ou à noite;

3.1.11. Comprometa-se a retornar para seu país de origem após a conclusão do programa e satisfazer a exigência do visto categoria "J": residir por dois anos em seu país de origem antes de retornar aos EUA na mesma categoria;

3.1.12. Possa iniciar o programa de intercâmbio acadêmico nos Estados Unidos em julho de 2021.

4. INELEGIBILIDADE

4.1. Indivíduos nas seguintes circunstâncias NÃO são elegíveis para o programa Community College Initiative:

4.1.1. Cidadãos dos EUA;

4.1.2. Cidadãos não americanos que vivem nos Estados Unidos;

4.1.3. Indivíduos que atualmente participam de programas acadêmicos, de treinamento ou de pesquisa nos Estados Unidos;

4.1.4. Indivíduos que atualmente estudam, residem ou trabalham fora do Brasil;

4.1.5. Indivíduos que participaram de um programa de intercâmbio para visitantes patrocinado ou financiado pelo governo dos Estados Unidos por um período de mais de seis semanas e que não cumpriram o requisito de residência domiciliar de dois anos até o momento de sua inscrição no CCI;

4.1.6. Indivíduos que solicitaram residência permanente nos EUA;

4.1.7. Funcionários locais das missões dos EUA no exterior que trabalham para o Departamento de Estado dos EUA e / ou para a Agência dos EUA para o Desenvolvimento Internacional (USAID). Os funcionários também são inelegíveis por um ano após a rescisão do contrato de trabalho;

4.1.8. Membros da família imediata (ou seja, cônjuges e filhos) de funcionários da Embaixada dos EUA e da Comissão Fulbright. Os membros da família também são inelegíveis por um ano após a rescisão do contrato de trabalho;

5. PROCESSO E CRITÉRIOS DE ANÁLISE DE INSCRIÇÃO APÓS A INDICAÇÃO

5.1. Após o envio das candidaturas indicadas ao Consulado dos EUA pelo IF Sudeste MG, todas as inscrições serão analisadas no país quanto à elegibilidade e avaliadas por um painel de especialistas em programas de intercâmbio. Os candidatos competitivos serão entrevistados em seus países de origem por um comitê de nomeação da embaixada dos EUA. Todos os candidatos serão notificados de sua nomeação e colocação entre o final de março e o final de maio de 2021.

5.2. O comitê de nomeação usará os seguintes critérios para avaliar as candidaturas (não em ordem de importância):

- 5.2.1. Interesse demonstrado e objetivos profissionais no campo de estudo que o candidato deseja seguir;
 - 5.2.2. Interesse transcultural;
 - 5.2.3. Potencial de liderança;
 - 5.2.4. Flexibilidade e adequação como intercambista;
 - 5.2.5. Proficiência em inglês (escrita e fala);
 - 5.2.6. Habilidade física e disponibilidade para completar o programa na sua totalidade, incluindo atividades ou viagens que podem ser programadas em quaisquer dias da semana e durante a manhã ou à noite;
 - 5.2.7. Compromisso de retornar ao país de origem após o programa para cumprir um requisito de residência de dois anos;
 - 5.2.8. Será dada preferência a candidatos que não tenham experiência anterior fora de seus países de origem;
 - 5.2.9. Será dada preferência aos candidatos que representam comunidades carentes e sub-representadas, incluindo mulheres;
 - 5.2.10. Será dada preferência aos candidatos que concluíram o ensino médio e ainda não obtiveram um diploma equivalente a um bacharelado nos Estados Unidos ou outro grau superior;
 - 5.2.11. Será dada preferência aos candidatos que melhor expressarem como o Programa CCI se conecta diretamente à sua trajetória e metas pessoais e profissionais - a curto e longo prazo.
- Parágrafo único:** as etapas e critérios supracitados no item 5 são de inteira responsabilidade do painel de especialistas dos Consulados e da Embaixada dos EUA.

6. PROVISÕES FINANCEIRAS DA CONCESSÃO

6.1. A embaixada dos EUA cobrirá os custos referentes a:

- 6.1.1. Suporte para visto J-1;
- 6.1.2. Viagem de ida e volta da cidade de residência do participante até a instituição anfitriã nos Estados Unidos;
- 6.1.3. Mensalidade e taxas universitárias obrigatórias;
- 6.1.4. Alojamento e refeições;
- 6.1.5. Pequeno subsídio para livros, materiais, e despesas acessórias;
- 6.1.6. Cobertura limitada de acidentes e doenças em conformidade com o visto J;

- 6.1.7. Cobertura de uma variedade de atividades de desenvolvimento pessoal e profissional nos Estados Unidos.
- 6.2. Caso seja possível, o IF Sudeste MG auxiliará os alunos selecionados no deslocamento até o aeroporto de partida no Brasil.
- 6.3. A emissão de passaporte para participação no programa é de responsabilidade dos candidatos.

7. INSTRUÇÕES GERAIS DE CANDIDATURA

7.1. Os interessados em se candidatar a esta chamada devem atender, necessariamente a todos os pontos abaixo:

- 7.1.1. Enviar um formulário original (**ANEXO II**) em inglês, preenchido com assinatura na última página;
 - 7.1.2. Cada candidato deve preencher seu próprio formulário de inscrição. Os candidatos podem consultar outras pessoas para obter conselhos sobre como preencher o formulário, mas cada candidato deve escrever suas próprias respostas;
 - 7.1.3. Responder TODAS as perguntas da inscrição em inglês. NÃO deixar espaços em branco. Se uma pergunta não se aplica a você, digite N/A (não aplicável);
 - 7.1.4. Incluir seu nome legal completo com nome de família (sobrenome) em MAIÚSCULAS primeiro, conforme escrito em seu passaporte internacional (se disponível);
 - 7.1.5. Incluir informações de contato completas, incluindo códigos postais para todos os endereços e códigos de cidade e país para todos os números de telefone;
 - 7.1.6. As aplicações manuscritas devem ser impressas ordenadamente;
 - 7.1.7. Enviar a inscrição até o prazo estabelecido neste edital para atender aos prazos definidos pela Embaixada dos Estados Unidos ou pela Comissão Fulbright localizada em seu país.
- 7.2. Os *essays* (redações), parte integrante e obrigatória do formulário de inscrição original, deverão ser enviados juntamente com a documentação requisitada, e serão utilizados como parte do processo seletivo local realizado pelo IF Sudeste MG (ver item 9.2.2 deste edital).
- 7.3. Todos os candidatos devem enviar, além dos documentos indicados, os seguintes comprovantes:
- 7.3.1. o histórico acadêmico com a indicação dos períodos já cursados, com a indicação do índice de integralização;
 - 7.3.2. comprovante de matrícula atual.

8. DA INSCRIÇÃO

8.1. Todos os documentos relacionados acima no item 7 devem ser encaminhados ao email <internacional@ifsudestemg.edu.br> indicando no assunto o edital e o nome do candidato: “Inscrição CCI - Nome Sobrenome”.

8.2. Caso mais de um email seja enviado pelo mesmo candidato, somente o último será considerado, conforme critérios de data e de horário de entrada da mensagem na caixa, e todas as documentações necessárias deverão estar devidamente indicadas no nome dos arquivos.

9. DA SELEÇÃO

9.1. O processo seletivo para participar do Programa CCI ocorrerá em até quatro (04) etapas, a saber:

- 9.1.1. Seleção/Indicação local - IF Sudeste MG ;
- 9.1.2. Embaixada EUA - Belo Horizonte;
- 9.1.3. Embaixada EUA - Brasília;
- 9.1.4. Departamento de Estado dos EUA Washington (caso necessário).

9.2. Esta chamada irá indicar 2 discentes do IF Sudeste MG para participarem da seleção nacional. Devido à condição sanitária que impede a realização de atividades presenciais, a seleção local acontecerá integralmente on-line, em duas (02) etapas:

- 9.2.1. Análise das redações em inglês solicitados no formulário de inscrição (ver Anexo I); As redações solicitadas no formulário original serão tomadas como critério avaliativo da seleção local e serão avaliadas conforme tabela indicada a seguir;
